

Know Your Arthritis: OA vs. RA

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Summary: The differences between osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis are explored, including strategies for conservative management. Pharmacologic treatment options for both diseases are reviewed.

Nursing Implications:

- Pain management can be critical to quality of life for a patient with either disease.
- Regular functional assessment is important to help the patient maintain independence while addressing changes from the disease.
- Assistive devices may be needed for mobility and performance of life functions.
- Patients should have a careful balance of activity and rest.
